women gain financial independence through access to credit and entrepreneurial opportunities. Socially, they challenge outdated norms and foster community support, helping women to stand up for their rights and advocate for themselves. Politically, NGOs encourage women's involvement in local governance and decision-making, amplifying their voices and influence in their communities [5].

The research emphasizes NGOs' essential role in improving the socio-economic status of these women, though its focus on a specific demographic may limit broader applicability [6].
- (2) **Lenka, U., & Agarwal, S. (2017):** Through case studies and qualitative analysis, this research explores how NGOs promote entrepreneurship among women in Uttarakhand. It highlights both successful practices and challenges faced by women entrepreneurs. The insights provided can guide similar contexts in stimulating economic development; however, the regional focus may restrict generalizability [7].
- (3) **Sinha, P. (2003):** This study employs surveys and qualitative analysis to examine the motivations and constraints faced by women entrepreneurs in North East India. It identifies key factors influencing entrepreneurial activities and suggests policy interventions to enhance opportunities. While providing valuable insights into the specific context, its regional focus may limit the relevance of the findings to other areas [8].
- (4) **Mitra, A. (2011):** Using qualitative case studies, this research analyzes feminist organizing within NGOs in India, focusing on women's roles and experiences. It offers critical insights into how feminist practices influence NGO policies. However, the specific focus on feminist organizing may not apply to all NGOs, limiting generalizability [9].

- (5) **Mercer, C. (2002):** This literature review critically assesses the roles of NGOs in democratization and civil society development. It provides a comprehensive overview of how NGOs contribute to democratic processes, though its broad scope may lack detailed empirical evidence and not include recent developments in the field [10].
- (6) **Sridhar, M., & Nagabhushanam, V. (2008):** Investigating the uniqueness and critical success factors of NGOs in India through focus group discussions, this study identifies characteristics such as strong community ties and effective leadership as essential for success. However, the qualitative nature and limited participant pool may not fully capture the diversity of the NGO landscape [11].
- (7) **Handy, F., & Kassam, M. (2006):** This qualitative study explores rural NGOs' roles in women's empowerment, revealing a notable impact through skill enhancement and leadership training. However, it identifies a dissonance between advocacy messages and actual practices, raising concerns about credibility and effectiveness [12].
- (8) **Kilby, P. (2010):** Through a literature review and case studies, Kilby addresses the complexities NGOs face in India regarding accountability. The study highlights tensions between meeting donor expectations and addressing grassroots needs, suggesting a balanced approach to enhance empowerment initiatives' effectiveness [13].
- (9) **Gupta, S. (2021):** This research focuses on NGO contributions to women's empowerment in Uttarakhand through self-help groups (SHGs). It finds that SHG involvement increases financial literacy and social participation among women. While effective locally, the findings may not be applicable to regions with different socio-cultural contexts [14].
- (10) **Al Hakim, A., et al. (2022):** Conducting a systematic review of various NGO projects, this study analyzes their effectiveness and sustainability in promoting women's empowerment. It emphasizes that while many initiatives have positive impacts, sustainability is often compromised by a lack of ongoing support. The authors advocate for prioritizing community engagement and capacity building in project design [15].

These studies collectively underscore the vital role of NGOs in empowering women across various contexts, while also highlighting challenges related to accountability, sustainability, and the need for localized approaches. The insights gained from these works can guide future research and inform policy aimed at enhancing the effectiveness of women's empowerment initiatives globally.

While many projects achieve short-term successes, the lack of ongoing support and community engagement often undermines long-term outcomes.
